MESSAGE

My dear Sisters in Christ through Mama Mary:

"If sin entered into the world through a woman, salvation entered into the world through a woman. If sin entered into the world through Eve, salvation entered into the world through Mary."



This was pointed out by Rev. Fr. Rafael Cabarles, OSB in his talk on Marian devotion during the assembly of Region IX in Palau, Calatrava, San Carlos City.

Today we are at the crossroads of actions and challenges. Confusion abounds. Natural calamities like typhoons leading to widespread flooding not experienced before wreak havoc in the lives of many, especially the poor and marginalized, and particularly our small farmers. Who can we turn to?

These bills are made palatable for the non-discerning to accept, unaware of their evil consequences. We can only turn to our Mother Mary to deliver us from the claws of evil. Mary's role in the history of salvation cannot be discounted. Mary prayed a lot, at the foot of the Cross on Good Friday, at the Tomb on Easter Sunday. It is her holiness that saves the world. The time is now, more than ever, for the Daughters of Mary Immaculate to emulate this holiness of Mary, the only weapon to fight evil.

There is now a call for us DMIs to join in prayer in this project of the Marian Solidarity for Pope Benedict XVI:

"A million roses for the world. Filipinos at prayer. Peace for all nations."

DMIs are enjoined to pray the five decades of the Holy Rosary daily from October 10, 2011 to May 13, 2012, Monday to Saturday, dedicated to one nation in the world, while the Sunday Rosary is reserved for our families and our nation, the Philippines.

Let us also pray for a deep moral renewal from within, a revolution of sorts – a moral and spiritual revolution for all our political leaders that they may value human life, because it is these moral values that will ultimately determine our future.

As DMIs, let us be like Mary, be a model of service, prayerful, humble and not self-seeking. Let us involve more women to our cause. There are many who are just waiting to be led to Mother Mary, as we realized from our Macau sojourn, when we organized the Our Lady of Fatima Circle there. It was not easy but Mother Mary was with us all the way, recharging us with energy when we were weary, boosting our morale when we seemed hopeless, guiding us as we convinced them, mostly OFWs, of our great trust in our work of bringing them closer to our Lord through Mother Mary. We succeeded, and so the first DMI circle in Asia outside of the Philippines was born on September 25, 2011. AVE MARIA!

Diocese of Dipolog Hosts 22nd Mindanao Area Conference

he Zamboanga del Norte Cultural & Sports Center in Dipolog City was the setting of the 22nd Mindanao Area Conference on April 29-30, 2011. DMI sisters from all over Mindanao started arriving in Dipolog City on April 28. International officers led by International Regent Sis. Lydia Ramirez were welcomed by Sis. Nonie Lacaya, diocesan regent of Dipolog.

A Eucharistic celebration at the Our Lady of the Most Holy Rosary Cathedral signaled the start of the conference on the morning of April 29. The Mass was officiated by Most Rev. Jose Manguiran, DD with Fr. Cesar Tinga as cocelebrant. In his homily, Bishop Manguiran cited the Gospel of St. Luke pertaining to the Book of Isaiah about Jesus as the cornerstone or foundation of the church. The Dipolog KC-DMI Choir provided the liturgical music during the Mass.

The conference formally opened with the traditional opening ceremonies with the entrance of the image of the Blessed Mother, the International Officers led by Sis.Lyding and the

Sis. Lyding in her inspirational message reiterated her call to establish DMI circles in every parish in the country so that more women may be able to reach out to those who are in need. SMI International Chairperson

Sis. Ruby Macario informed the delegates about the changes effected in the SMI organization to attract more Squirettes of Mary members. Her call was for the establishment of SMI circlettes by every existing DMI circle nationwide. The closing remarks by Sis. Zeny Martinez ended the day's session.

Highlight of the evening fellowship on Day 1 were the dance presentations by circles representing the different regions of Mindanao. Special guests were Dipolog City Mayor Evelyn Tang-Uy and Past KC State Advocate Bro.

Uldarico Mejorada. A meditation song by Sis. Elba Ladera ended the evening program.

The morning session of Day 2 opened with a message by Past Diocesan Regent Sis. Mila Jauculan. The program consisted of presentations by invited speakers on the DMI missions: Retired Judge Eustola Mata on Upliftment of Women Workers, declaring woman as a special creation, she being drawn by God from Adam's ribs; International Chairperson Sis. Sonia Manlapig on Morality in Media; Fr. Patrick Dalangan, diocesan director and chaplain of the Prison Ministry, on Assistance to Prisoners' Families & their Victims, who, citing the Gospel of Matthew, declared that it is the moral responsibility of every Christian to perform corporal acts of mercy, that bringing prisoners food and gifts is not

enough, and that what matters most to prison inmates is being in close contact with their families; and Fr. Joel Agad on Pro-Life who said that one should choose life, a gift of God to His creatures.

A Plenary Session opened by Region XIV Representative Sis. Miriam Angot took most of the afternoon. The delegates were divided into workshops for the various DMI thrusts. The workshop outputs consisted of suggested plans and programs and resolutions which the Conference Committee compiled. The session ended with an Anticipated Mass by Fr. Virgilio Belleno, Cathedral Parish rector and DMI diocesan chaplain.

A festive mood pervaded the conference venue in the evening with a Hawaiian *luau* as motif of

In the morning, we proceeded to Dipolog and went straight to the cathedral for the opening Eucharistic celebration.

Indeed Mama Mary was with us!

The Board meeting was scheduled after lunch so that we had time for more shopping in the morning. We bought identical blouses, our improvised costume for the interpretative dance. Lunch was at Alavar Restaurant with its famous *curacha* (coconut crab) dish. We also feasted on *marang*.

The meeting which started at 1:00 p.m. lasted till late afternoon. The telephone rang asking for Sis. Lyding at about 5:00 p.m. for an important family matter. Vice-IR for Luzon Sis. Mila Villanueva took over as presiding officer. It was then that we learned that Sis. Lyding's children prepared a surprise birthday dinner for her.

"See what you have and enjoy them. Balance your life. That's how you can attain health, beauty and long life," Sis. Lyding exhorted. She ended her inspirational message by reminding the DMIs present to continue the fight against the passage of the Reproductive Health Bill and the Divorce Bill which destroy the essence of family, the bedrock of society.

The morning's guest speaker was Ms. Elvie Punzalan-Estavillo, the founder of Laughter Yoga in the Philippines. Ms. Estavillo, an ex-ADB staffer, was introduced by Region V Alternate RR Sis. Cora Afuana, Ms. Estavillo said that laughter yoga started in Mumbai, India in 1995. Finding for herself the many benefits of laughter yoga, "the easiest, fastest stress buster", it became her advocacy. "Laughter is nature's best moisturizer and tranquilizer. One minute of laughter equals 10 minutes of carbo exercise," she said. She also told her

audience that the laughter must come from the heart, accompanied by breathing (oxygenation) from the diaphragm. Exhalation must take longer. She demonstrated and taught her audience yoga exercises that would serve as therapy for some illnesses, even defective vision. The hall resounded with laughter; the laughter yoga dictating the delegates' mood for the rest of the day.

The afternoon session started with the reports of the mission chairpersons: Sis. Helen de Leon for Prolife, Sis. Milde Tong for Assistance to Prisoners' Families & their Victims, Sis. Sonia Manlapig for Morality in Media, Sis. Sally Estrada, *DMI Newsette* editor who pinch-hitted for Sis. Linda Castillo for Upliftment of Women Workers and Sis. Ruby Macario for Squirettes of Mary.

Fr. Dennis Paez, SDB was the afternoon's guest speaker whose presentation centered on "The Truths on the Blessed Mother" for "To Know HER

Is To Love HIM More". Fr. Paez was introduced by Sis. Mosette Don, vicarial regent of San Martin de Porres, Diocese of Paranaque. From her, we learned that Fr. Paez is a marriage and family counselor and a Mariologist.

Fr. Paez talked on the dogmas and truths about Mary as a consequence of her being the mother of Jesus. He enumerated the Catholic Church's five dogmas on the Blessed Mother, citing their biblical, ecclesiastical and traditional bases. The five dogmas are:

The dogma of Mary as the mother of God
The dogma of the perpetual virginity of Mary
The dogma of the
Immaculate Conception

The dogma of the Assumption of Mary The dogma of Mary as the Mediatrix of All Grace

The first four dogmas have already been proclaimed. Work is in progress for the proclamation of the fifth dogma.

Fr. Paez, his talk punctuated by his characteristic humor, underscored the role that the Blessed Mother had taken in the work of Redemption and her continuing work as mediatrix at various points in the history of the Catholic Church. Through all these, he said that the Blessed Mother's message is that she loves us very much. And how do we respond to such love? By upholding and practicing three virtues:

humility, humility, humility. All else follow.

The conference session ended with a Thanksgiving prayer led by Sis. Ruby Macario. But this did not signal the end of the assembly. The delegates had their *merienda-cena* while eagerly awaiting the mini-concert of the Mid-Life Crisis Band, a group of doctors and professionals led by Ronnie Henares.

It was worth an hour's wait. A re-charged crowd swayed, stomped, danced and jumped as the band dished out the music hits of the 60s, 70s and 80s. Even the seniors seemed not to tire until the band played the last song at 7:30 p.m.

And who says that fun and

enjoyment have no room when serving the Lord and Mother Mary? The Bible says something about this: "A cheerful heart is good medicine; but a crushed spirit dries up the bones." (Proverbs 17:21)

As the delegates walked past the doors on their way home, they thanked Sis. Mila for the unique and enjoyable program. Their comments, in summary are as follows: "Super saya talaga! Good work!" (Sis.Menchie) 'We enjoyed and learned a lot; the laughter is medicine for both body and soul. Thank you and God bless." (Sis. Lucy Flores) "We never danced as we did tonight." (Sisters from Palawan) "One of the best I ever attended. Fr. Dennis Paez was heavensent." (Sis. Sonia)

Our Lady of the Atonement Circle Reaches Out with a "Cleaning" Hand

group of DMI sisters from the newly organized Our Lady of the Atonement Circle in Baguio City turned over last April 7, 2011 cleaning materials for a carwash outlet located at the ground floor of the Cobalt Bldg. of Baguio General Hospital right at the junction leading to Kennon Road.

What sets this carwash outlet apart from the others in Baguio City is that it was organized and now being manned by selected members of the city's recognized and accredited group of persons with disabilities, the Fr. Rafael Desmedt Multi-Purpose Cooperative (FARAD). The carwash business is run by the Anti-Poverty Commission – Persons with Disabilities Office (NAPC-PWD) which was established in 2002.

The NAPC was created under the provisions of RA 8425 which aims to institutionalize the social reform and

poverty alleviation program of the government. Persons with disabilities have been identified as one of several marginalized sectors needing particular assistance. The NAPC-PWD Office is headed by Mr. Edward de los Santos, a wheelchair user himself. The carwash business is one of several initiatives to engender self-reliance among physically-challenged citizens and help them gain financial independence.

The Pro-Life Committee of the Our Lady of the Atonement Circle chose to support the NAPC-PWD's carwash business as its first outreach project. Donations of carwash supplies such as Formula 1 shampoos and waxes, sponges, car chamois, felts and others were turned over to Mr. de los Santos (Manong Edward) himself who expressed deep appreciation for the donations he received on behalf of his hearing- and orthopedically-

impaired employees at the carwash.

The funds used to buy the carwash supplies were personal donations of the circle members led by the Pro-Life Committee's Sisters Edith Grageda, Aurora Ambanloc and Lourdes Dauz. Also with the group during the turn-over of donations were Regent Sis. Zeny Cabunilas, Vice-Regent Sis. Rose Jamorabon, Recording Secretary Sis. Meli Escano, Chancellor Sis. Lyn Zamuco and Inner Guide Sis. Cristie Escano.

The Circle's first outreach project brought deep satisfaction and sense of fulfillment to the DMI sisters. 
