18th DMI Biennial Convention - Best Attended Yet!




The enthronement of the Blessed Virgin Mary on the stage ushered in the biennial convention.

he sea of blue that we usually see during assemblies and conferences of the Daughters of Mary Immaculate International virtually turned into an ocean when more than 1,600 delegates turned up at the Tagaytay International Convention Center last May 12, 2012. It was the largest assemblage ever in the history of the DMI.

The overwhelming support of DMIs all over the country became evident when, as early as mid-March, over a thousand have already registered for the event and more continued to be received by the Convention Registration Committee. Despite the inconveniences created by such a huge crowd, with delegates literally rubbing elbows with one another and filling every available space – the main hall, the anteroom, the balcony and elsewhere – the DMI sisters bore them all with patience, temperance and humility. So Mary-like!

Handling the huge attendance posed a problem for Region V, the host region, with Sis. Mila Villanueva, Vice-Int'l Regent for Luzon and Region V RR, at the helm. Employing some creativity, such as numbered seats corresponding to the dates the delegates registered (first-come-

weather (it starts to rain in Tagaytay at that time of the year), the convention came and went without any major hitch.

The opening ceremonies started promptly at 9:00 a.m. with a touching ceremony for the Enthronement of the Blessed Mother participated in by the International Officers and Board, the Mission chairpersons and the host committee. It was followed by the parade of colors and presentation of circles by dioceses from Regions I to XIV.


His Eminence Gaudencio B. Cardinal Rosales, Archbishop Emeritus of Manila, was the convention keynote speaker and main celebrant during the Eucharistic celebration on the first day of the convention. Co-celebrating with him was DMI Vice-International Chaplain Fr. Jerome Cruz.

Taking off from the convention theme "Strengthening of Faith in Jesus through Mary in the DMI Missions", Cardinal Rosales congratulated the Daughters of Mary Immaculate for being the first group to seriously take Pope Benedict XVI's challenge in the celebration of the Year of Faith which he declared to start on Oct. 11, 2012, the Golden Jubilee of the Opening of the Second Vatican Council and end on Nov. 24, 2013, the solemnity of Christ the King, with the theme "The New Evangelization for the Transmission of Christian Faith".

He urged the convention delegates to understand their faith and to be witnesses to it. He said that it is from the Church that our educational system emanated through its monastic schools which later shaped our social, economic, cultural and

political systems.

"There can be no faith without Jesus and no Jesus without Mary," the Cardinal stressed. "Mary is the original Nazarene as she had been chosen to carry in her womb the Son of God." Faith grows when it is lived. The Cardinal then cited the missions of the DMI as manifestations of living the faith by intensifying the witness of charity. St. Paul has reminded us: "So faith, hope and love abide, these three; but the greatest of these is love." (1 Cor. 13:13)

Convention Chairperson Sis. Mila V. officially welcomed the delegates and thanked them for their overwhelming support by their presence. She pleaded for their understanding and patience for the inconveniences they may be experiencing in such a crowded venue, but expressed her hope that the program lined up during the entire convention will more than compensate for them.

The Annual Business Meeting followed.

International Regent Sis. Lyding Ramirez delivered a very short annual report and referred her audience to the broadsheet-type printed (in full color yet!) report provided in their convention kits. The things she did during her term, to name a few: attended all the regional assemblies held in all the 14 DMI regions and the area conferences in Luzon, Visayas and Mindanao (practically going island-hopping every month), and her call for a DMI circle in every parish resulting in the formation of 24 new

circles (including a second circle in California and one in Macau) and 22 SMI circlettes in 2011.

International Treasurer Sis. Ofelia Lucas then rendered her report on the organization's financial operation and condition.

Lunch was served under a giant tent outside the Convention Hall. (The weather cooperated beautifully and nobody got wet going to the luncheon venue. Thanks to Mama Mary's intercession!)

The afternoon session

started with a talk by Mr. Bernard F. Canaberal, a long-time media practitioner who for many years has been hosting the Family Rosary Crusade (now being aired every Sunday, 7-8 a.m. on Studio 23 and TV Maria) and the program "Pamilya Mo, Pamilya Ko" over Radio Veritas from Monday to Friday, written thousands of plays for both radio and television, done social documentaries and music videos for religious organizations, private corporations and government institutions and written, produced, and performed in countless plays staged by major theater groups. He was introduced by International Chairperson for Morality in Media Sis. Sonia Manlapig.

Speaking on the topic "Mary, Media and the Rosary", Mr. Canaberal started his presentation by paying tribute to the Blessed Virgin Mary and her role in Man's Redemption. He also cited the many instances in the salvation history of the world when her powerful intercession changed the turn of events through her apparitions in many parts of the world – to St. Dominic of Guzman up on a mountain where she gifted him with a rosary, her appearance to St.

Bernadette Soubirous in Lourdes, France, to the three children – Lucia, Francisco and Jacinta – in Fatima, Portugal and many more in recent times, always imparting the urgent message for people to pray the rosary everyday.

He also mentioned the Luminous Mysteries that Pope John Paul II added to the three Mysteries of the Rosary (Joyful, Sorrowful and Glorious) that recall the public ministry of Jesus.

"The rosary is our hotline to God," Mr. Canaberal stated. As a meditative prayer, it invokes silence which is the language of God.

As for media, he quoted a statement by Fr. James Reuter, S.J.: "Media is the wildest experiment ever unleashed on modern man with no foreknowledge of what it would do to him." Indeed, the family is the most threatened of all species today. He said that the influence of media has been most pervasive. Media have challenged the value system established by old traditional institutions - the home, the church, the school. While these institutions

nurture the **give, care, share** and **love** values, media have now replaced them with **get, take, have** and **possess** mentality. Having become substitute parents in the house, they have even robbed real parents of their children's heart and soul. Children run to media for answers to their questions, for solutions to their problems.

According to Mr. Canaberal, media is just a construct – REEL and not REAL. And the power to control media is in our

hands if only there is love

in our hearts. Our task in the Information Age is to be at the service of TRUTH.

In spite of the unholy hour (right after lunch), Mr. Canaberal's audience sat in rapt attention for close to two hours, laughing heartily as he laced his talk with humorous anecdotes complete with sound effects and the thunder of his voice.

The reports of the International Chairpersons for the DMI Missions closed the session for Day 1:

Sis. Helen de Leon for Prolife summarized the projects and activities emanating from the National level that are being undertaken by circles in their parishes aimed at promoting, preserving and protecting life at all stages. She cited the two big challenges that confront us today - the **Reproductive Health Bill** and the ill effects of climate change. She urged the delegates to continue the ongoing nationwide campaigns in support of the stand of the Catholic Church against the RH Bill and the protection of the

environment.

Sis. Sonia Manlapig for Morality in Media reported the continuing liaison with government agencies such as the MTRCB and OMB and networking with NGOs and other groups to be able to accomplish this DMI mission as well as the grassroots activities of the circles in their respective parishes as they exercise vigilance in monitoring various forms of media in their communities and conducting values education for the youth and other sectors utilizing the media.

Sis. Milde Tong for Assistance to Prisoners' Families and their Victims gave an update report on what the circles have accomplished for the 10year Educational Program for families and victims of prisoners launched in 2011. It is a comprehensive program of granting scholarships to children aimed at providing and empowering them to think, choose and decide for the rest of their lives and live a dignified life as responsible family members and as contributing citizens of our country.

Sis. Linda Castillo for Upliftment of Women Workers cited the laws that have been enacted to protect the rights of women and batted for women empowerment, making special mention of women OFWs who comprise 60% of Filipinos working overseas.

Sis. Ruby Macario for Youth Welfare reported the increase in Squirettes of Mary circlettes since the launch of a campaign for more SMI members. Twenty-two new circlettes were organized during 2011 and more are in the process of being formed in different parts of the country. She also showcased some former

VIR – Visayas Sis. Carmen de la Torre then took over the rostrum to discuss the venue of the next DMI Biennial Convention, its 19th, with Visayas as convention host. The Diocese of Tagbilaran offered to host the convention in Bohol which the delegates overwhelmingly approved.

Ms. Lorna Melegrito, executive director of Pro-Life Philippines Foundation was the morning's main speaker. Her topic was "Pro-Life: A Testimony of Faith".

Ms. Melegrito, who was introduced by International Chairperson for Pro-life Sis. Helen de Leon, was a member of the academe for 28 years as classroom teacher and guidance counselor before joining Pro-Life Philippines in 2010. She holds a masters degree in psychology from the Philippine Women's University where she also obtained a bachelor's degree, also in psychology. She holds a Teacher's

Certificate in Special Education from De la Salle University and completed a Pro-life Basic Training Course by Dr. Brian Clowes of Human Life International. At present, Ms.Melegrito is actively involved in various socioreligious organizations among which are the Couples for Christ and Teodora (Foundation for Women Empowerment).

Ms.Melegrito's life as she related it, has been an example of one living out her faith – from the hard life her family had in Cagayan, walking to school in broken slippers and studying by a kerosene lamp at night. Her mother's unceasing faith gave her children the patience and courage to go on. Taking advantage of every opportunity that opened up for her made life gradually better. Her dictum: Don't lose hope, keep your faith, care for and share with others.

She also mentioned that man cannot be trusted to use God's wisdom properly. Going against His will, many have become anti-life; e.g.

abortion of female babies in China, availability of better agriculture to produce more food and yet many die of malnutrition and hunger.

"We need God's wisdom and grace," Ms. Melegrito said. "God has done His part. Let us do ours." And her parting words: Faith and prayer are the vitamins of the soul.

A Eucharistic celebration by Fr. Jerome preceded the official close of the Convention at 12:00 noon. Drawing his homily from the convention theme, he urged the DMIs present to live a life of faith. "God's love is ultimate and if you believe in God, believe in love, for God is love. If you know deep within you that God loves you, then you will know how to love. To remain in love, we must follow God's commandments."

The closing ceremonies and final blessing by Fr. Jerome officially closed the 18th DMI Biennial Convention. Lunch was provided at the venue. While some of the delegates prepared to go home, others opted to stay a little longer to take in the scenic views of Tagaytay and shop at its numerous stalls and shops for souvenirs to take home.

Our Lady of Atonement Circle Members and their Spouses Attend Gender-Sensitivity Seminar

e are born either male or female – and nothing, not even the most modern medical procedure, can change that. While birth determines sex, gender refers to a set of expected behaviors, attitudes and roles usually assigned to either male or female by a particular culture or society. Gender, unlike sex, does not refer to physical attributes but to qualities or traits which, except in very minor areas, do not depend on whether one is male or female. Both males and females, therefore, share valuable attributes which contribute to development. Females and males should complement each other, especially since both have a stake in the country's progress. This was the basis of the Gender Sensitivity Seminar facilitated by the Civil Service Commission for members of the Our Lady of Atonement Circle of Baquio City held recently at the

Sangkabalayan Hall of the Baguio Cathedral.

The first-level Gender Sensitivity Seminar, a project of the Circle's Upliftment of Women Workers Committee, was attended by Circle members and their spouses. The seminar was anchored on four basic premises: Gender is an issue which (I) does not intend to spur a war between the sexes, hence (2) it is not anti-male; further (3) both men and women are victims of violence, although statistics show that women are victims (of physical violence in particular) more than men, and finally, (4) both men and women have a stake in the struggle for gender equality.

The morning session of the seminar was enlivened by activities centered on games and self-expression, activities intended to differentiate between sex and gender as well as to explore and articulate gender issues. The afternoon session featured activities which aimed to make all participants hear women's voices and feel women's pain which as a consequence will result in a desirable future that one's commitment would ensure.

The seminar-workshop also addressed issues of gender bias – from the most mundane such as assigning colors to sexes (e.g., pink for females) to more life-affecting ones such as those concerning careers (e.g., engineering and medical courses and vocational trades involving machines and machine repair being strictly for men).

The deeply personal and cathartic RITWAL at seminar's end helped the participants achieve healing and renewed awareness of themselves. It was indeed an apt end to a day which helped all and sundry realize that oppression is not only manifested in physical forms, but may also be inflicted psychologically by hurtful words, taking each other for granted, or even by ingrained habits and cultural mores resulting in a diminished selfworth or sense of personhood.

On the whole, the activity opened not only the DMI sisters' mind but also left gems of wisdom. It is hoped that these gems will help them (and their spouses) foster better relationships and properly sensitize them as to how to view men and women in society – not as rivals or participants engaged in a master-servant, superiorsubordinate relationship, but as partners walking side by side towards a brighter future for the Filipino family and the Filipino nation. Ina ng Grasya ng Diyos Circle Conducts Info Drive vs. RH Bill

Support of the DMI's campaign Iagainst the Reproductive Health Bill, the Ina ng Grasya ng Diyos Circle held a symposium recently at the Our Lady of Fatima Parish Multi-Purpose Hall in Lias, Marilao, Bulacan. The activity is a joint project of the Circle's Pro-Life Committee headed by Sis. Luz Yuan and Morality in Media Committee headed by Sis. Mely de la Pena.

The symposium resource person was Sis. Tessie Bondoc, Pro-Life chair of the Diocese of Malolos.

Sis. Tessie discussed lengthily the provisions of the RH Bill from a layman's point of view based on the pro-life teachings of the Catholic Church. She discussed the ill effects of artificial family planning and use of contraceptives which can be lifethreatening for women. The Bill likewise treats contraceptives as essential medicines for which a huge amount of money will be appropriated once passed into law.

"Fertility and pregnancy are not illnesses or diseases requiring essential medicines," Sis. Tessie pointed out. The purpose of medicines is to heal, to save life and not to destroy it, she added. She also told her audience about the danger of providing mandatory sex education to very young children in schools that may promote sex

promiscuity, they being too young to understand the responsibilities of marital life, pro-creation and sexual acts.

Sis. Tessie also mentioned the different natural methods of family planning such as the ovulation or Billings method, basal body temperature and the symptom-thermal method which are acceptable to the Church.

She urged those present to continue supporting the Pro-life stand of the Catholic Church, suggesting the following actions: campaign for the non-approval

of the RH Bill, educate their families, neighbors and members of organizations where they belong, practice and promote natural family planning methods, not to use contraceptives, respect the human body, protect the unborn and to PRAY.

In ending, Sis. Tessie said that population control is not the solution to poverty in our country. It is the eradication of graft and corruption in government that will propel the country to economic development and growth.

ast November 30,2011, the Daughters of Mary Immaculate and the Squirettes of Mary Immaculate of the Diocese of Cubao had their first joint Advent Recollection at the 3rd floor of the Holy Family Parish Center in Quezon City. Recollection speaker was Fr. Larry Faraon, OP.

Fr. Larry expressed regret that developed countries such as Japan, Singapore and South Korea have the saddest citizens in Asia while the Filipinos, citizens of a third world country are among the happiest in the world. This he attributes to the fact that the Philippines is the only Catholic country in the Far East and it is from their faith that Filipinos draw encouragement and spiritual strength. "Filipino women may not be so pretty, but when they smile, they become captivatingly beautiful.

"The Philippines is a conglomeration of different kinds of people," Fr. Larry stated. And God gifts them with different talents and charisms to succeed in life regardless of the odds. Some may not be as fortunate as the others, yet every man or woman

is a son or daughter of God, no matter his or her station in life.

One good character trait that Fr. Larry suggests is the ability to shut one's mouth and to listen. Because it is only through silence that we can understand God's message that will lead us to His Kingdom.

He also touched on the Reproductive Health Bill which he said might pave the way for the passage of immoral laws such as assisted suicide or euthanasia. "Pregnancy brings forth life that is a source of joy in marriage," he continued. And if life is taken away, then joy is also taken away.

Larry urged his audience to always look up to God and have faith in Him Who is the Lord and Giver of life, good health and everything that one needs. In closing he said that Advent is the time of waiting with joyful expectation of the Lord's coming.


