A Circle Is Born In Macau

Our dream has always been to expand . . . to once again go beyond Philippine shores. Now there are two circles in California and a third nearer home . . . in Asia.

Yes, we did it! We now have a circle in Macau . . . but not without challenges. Here's our Macau diary:

September 23, 2011 (Friday). Seven DMI sisters and a daughter five from St. Joseph Circle of Zamboanga City headed by International Regent Sis. Lydia Ramirez, Vicarial Regent Sis. Pinky Saavedra and daughter Fatima Mae, Regent Sis. Bernadette Santiago, Past Regent Sis. Patsy Ebol and Financial Secretary Sis. Rose Bulawin, and from the Risen Christ Circle of Paranague, Sister Milde Tong, regent of the Diocese of Paranague and myself – boarded a Cebu Pacific flight for Macau, arriving there at 9:00 p.m.

We were met at the airport by Sis. Eleanor Uy-Sin, St. Joseph Circle's Macau coordinator. As we were a big group, it took a while for us to get three taxis to bring us to Red Square District some 40 minutes away where the

hotel is located.

The 'fun' started when we got to our hotel. Since pensiones were not familiar with us and we were not briefed beforehand, our hotel turned out to be a pensione with a narrow entrance with the stairs directly in front of the door. The rooms we were billeted in were on the second floor requiring two flights of steep stairs. Going up was already a challenge, but lugging our suitcases was an even daunting one.

Sisters Lyding, Patsy and Rose tried the first three steps but gave up. (They left Zamboanga at 5:00 a.m. and had been on their feet for 15 hours!) "Aren't we supposed to be billeted in Guandong Hotel?" they asked.

Myrna Recto, a nice shy lady who is one of the DMI recruits embarrassingly explained that she booked the two pensione rooms because the rate is only a fifth of a regular hotel room. The rooms were pre-paid by her from money she borrowed, but she told the group that she will try to get a refund. That being the case, five of us

decided to stay. Sisters Lyding, Patsy and Rose will stay in Guandong.

After putting our things in our pensione room, we all walked to Guandong Hotel 'just around the corner' (which actually were three corner turns), lugging luggages along an almost empty street at 11:00 p.m. Finally we got the only room available for the night. "Let's worry about tomorrow," we said.

September 24,
Saturday. A nice fine
day! After breakfast, the
five 'pensione' sisters
fetched the three sisters
in Guandong. Once again,
lugging their suitcases and
things, we began our hunt
for the 'other hotel'
nearby. Heading the
group was Sis. Eleanor,
holding a piece of paper
with the name and address

of the hotel which is only by the corner at the end of the road. The group got to the first corner, crossed the street and turned another long corner, but no hotel. Finally at the third corner, we asked a gentlemen passing by. He said, "Do you see that blue canopy after this high wall? Cross the street to a park and that is where the hotel is."

This road was a four-lane road with beautiful Swiss-type buildings. This walk was about a kilometer of ascending road. Tired and thirsty after having walked about 3 kilometers, we sat on

the park benches, taking turns to take photos for posterity. We all heartily laughed when we overheard some Filipinos passing by saying, "Ay, kawawa naman, walang matirahan!"Having rested, we walked another 500 meters and there it is. the hotel! Two street levels up! Nice hotel! Looks like fivestar. Before starting our ascent, Sis. Lyding asked, "By the way, how much is it per night?" Sis. Eleanor answered, "It's 2,300 patakas." What? That is more than P15,000! Let's all go back to the pensione. And there we all stayed "happily ever after". We all rewarded

ourselves with a hearty lunch of roast goose and noodles.

September 25, Sunday.

This is the BIG day! We started with a Mass at Our Lady of Fatima Church. We all felt like we were in the Philippines as the Mass was attended by almost 80% Filipinos. They also had their choir group accompanied by a Filipino guitarist. The pastor of Our Lady of Fatima Parish is Fr. Jose Angel Castellano Hernandez, a Puerto Rican. Lunch was prepared by our hosts and the candidates for DMI membership. All 15 of them joined us for lunch of five different versions of pancit bijon, boiled vegetables with bagoong Balayan sauce and adobo. Who said we missed Filipino food?

After our lunch, the orientation started. I talked about the DMI organization, its Vision and Mission, the members' duties and responsibilities, the finer points of being a DMI and the perks of being a member. Sis. Milde handled the 5 Thrusts, zeroing in on what they can do as overseas Filipinos in a country which is not Catholic.

Mid-way through the orientation, Fr. Mierg Driod, a Polish who takes charge of mandated organizations in the parish, came by to listen for a while. After our talks, he left and came back with two half-gallons of Magnolia Ice Cream.

The 15 candidates were at first hesitant about proceeding to their conferral. But thanks to Fr. Mierg, the ladies agreed.

Thus was born the Our Lady of Fatima Circle in the parish of the same name and located within the grounds of the big Girls' Catholic School in Macau.

Election of officers followed with the installation of the following: Sisters Myrna Recto, regent; Judy Daddli, vice-regent; Ma. Fe Grumo, financial secretary; Mayolyn Saddi, recording secretary; Rusela Baltar, chancellor, Lerma Tria, treasurer; Irene Abellano, scribe; Jackelyn Grumo, monitor; Jackeline Tacadera, trustee and Precy Arandela, banner bearer.

Sometime soon, we shall be returning to Macau to confer more new members and to Hongkong to initiate a new circle. Let us all pray that our Mother Mary Immaculate will help us to connect with the many women workers in Hongkong.

We were challenged! We were tired! But no one got angry. No one was disappointed. We simply laughed all our trials away. There is no challenge big enough that we as DMIs can't overcome. As long as we all work for the glory of Jesus through Mary.

The visit gave the sisters an opportunity to interact with the women detainees some of whom have been neglected by their families. The sisters distributed Christmas cards for the detainees to send to their loved ones, the delivery

Mila Reyes of the Vicariate of St. Martin of Tours & St. Francis of Assissi and I, then regent of the Ina ng Grasya ng Diyos Circle of Marilao, Bulacan went to see Fr. Benny Justiniano, pastor of St. Joseph the Worker Parish. Armed with our letter-proposal, we requested Fr. Benny to allow us to form a DMI circle in his parish. The good-natured priest received us warmly and promised to take up our proposal during the forthcoming planning conference of the Parish Pastoral Council.

Fr. Benny kept his word. During our next visit, he told us the good news that the PPC has approved our proposal. Some problems cropped up during the ensuing months but they didn't deter us from pursuing our goal. We intensified our member recruitment program with support from Sis. Bing Rescate, chair of the Family & Life Commission of the parish, Sis. Nina Varias, COS vice-chair who became a DMI member herself, and the Knights of Columbus.

Manggagawa Circle was
finally born and its charter
members officially became
DMI members during the
Diocesan Long Conferral
held on Nov. 12, 2011 in

ng Grasya ng Diyos Circle.
The first is the Sto. Nino de
Meycauayan Circle
organized on October 9,
2010.

Campus Media Sympo Series Goes On

he Morality in Media Committee of the Risen Christ Circle, Holy Eucharist Parish, Moonwalk Village, Paranaque City continues to conduct media symposiums in schools and communities to promote awareness of the adverse effects of excessive use of media.

A series was conducted during 2011 using the module entitled "Media – A Double-Edged Sword". The first was conducted on January 15, 2011 at the Sacred Heart School Gymnasium in Multinational Village in Paranaque attended by some 500 parents and 60 teachers and sisters of the school.

The second was a diocesan level symposium held at the Social Action Center of the Holy Eucharist Parish for 43 Squirettes of Mary and 12 DMI sisters from five circles in the Diocese of Paranaque on July 16 and the last was on November 19 for 300 parents of high school students of Sacred Heart School.

During the symposium, the parents were requested to monitor the kind of reading materials, viewing materials and means of communication their children are exposed to during the day. Likewise, the parents were also directed to adopt means by which they could have direct hand in the choice of media materials and entertainment for their children. Filipino values such as respect for elders, obedience to God, love for neighbors and others are also included in the module.

After the symposium, the parents

expressed their appreciation for the opportunity given to them and suggested that more of similar symposiums for more effective parenting be held in the future.



SISTERS ACT: A Special Moment with Dear Fathers



Fr. Fernando Suarez - Hope in Pandora's Box

andora's story teaches us that there is hope amid countless crises that befall humans. The human body, rendered imperfect by the original sin, is in itself a Pandora's box, a vessel for potentially sick, sometimes fatal, cells that can lead to diseases, ordinary or serious. But its immune system offers the first line of defense, constantly waging war against them and fending off ailments. However, in this age of relatively unhealthy lifestyles, the so-called auto-immune diseases leave it inefficient, sometimes useless. The result? Terminal, deadly and incurable diseases. For people desperately hoping for a cure, Fr. Fernando Suarez, the healing priest, may be their last and only chance, the remaining HOPE in Pandora's Box.

So on June 11, 2011, hundreds trooped to the Basilica Minore of Our Lady of Charity in Agoo, La Union. Most of them pre-registered days prior to Fr. Suarez's visit and many who had not pre-registered tried their luck as walk-in patients, hoping they could also make it to his queue. The day saw

people of varying degrees and seriousness of illnesses, from the ones nursing simple allergies and coughs to those who came in wheelchairs and stretchers carried along by relatives. All came for a sole purpose – to get a healing touch.

The sisters of the St. Francis Circle were deployed to ensure that everything would go well during the Mass and the healing sessions. They worked together with other church-based organizations like the Knights of Columbus and PREX. Weeks before the visit, Vicarial Regent Sis.

Agnes Laron who chaired the healing visit laid out the details to the sisters and charged them their work. The "marshals" would oversee the flow of people in all the five main doors of the Basilica. The "catchers" would lay patients gently on the marble floor after receiving Fr. Suarez's healing touch. Those in charge of the registration would list the patients' names and write their ailments on adhesive tags. The usherettes would lead them to where they should be during the healing mass and sessions. Since this was the last leg of Fr. Suarez's visit in La Union, they expected an unusually large number of patients, pre-registered and walk-in alike.

True to what they expected, the Basilica was filled to capacity in no time at all and still, long lines of people waited outside patiently, unmindful of the heat and the discomfort. Given priority were the sickest and the gravest. In his homily, Fr. Suarez emphasized that he is not the one who heals. He is simply the medium by which God heals His sick people. In short, faith

must be at work in one's heart if he ardently desires to be totally healed.

For hours, the queue was long and the pews full of people. Emotions rose when a patient suddenly stood from his wheelchair after Fr. Suarez touched his ailing part and walked on the aisle, staggering at first but gradually gaining speed and confidence. It was a long day for the DMI sisters who were almost drained of their energy. But when the last patient received his blessings early in the afternoon, it was as if they were instantly recharged – it was now their turn. They lined up before Fr. Suarez, clasped their hands in silent prayer and received God's healing through Fr. Suarez.

One particular song I have always loved is "Healing". Its chorus goes, "... 'cause your love just keeps on healing me, no matter how I bruise ..." Indeed God's love brings healing not just to our physical bodies. More importantly, it heals our hearts and souls. Fr. Suarez is a reminder of its awesome power.


A Pilgrimage in **Fulfillment of** a Sister's Last Wish

he search for the True Cross, the very one on which Christ Jesus, our Savior, was crucified, is one of the most colorful, enigmatic and even controversial mysteries of the Catholic faith. History holds that the first search for the True Cross was initiated by St. Helena (c. AD 250 -330), mother of Constantine, first Christian emperor of Rome. Legend has it that the venerable St. Helena was able to seek out the hiding place of the three crosses believed to have been used during Jesus Christ's crucifixion - one each for the two thieves, St. Dimas and Gestas, and the third used by Jesus Himself.

Eusebius of Caesaria, a renowned scholar of the early Christian era who authored The Life of Constantine, recounts how the Holy

Sepulchre, originally a site of veneration for the Christian community of Jerusalem, had been covered with earth and a temple to Venus built on top, probably as part of Emperor Hadrian's reconstruction of Jerusalem as *Aeolia Capitolina* in AD 135 at the height of the Roman era of Christian persecution. Socrates Scholasticus (born c. AD 380), in his Ecclesiastical History, gives an account detailing how St. Helena had the temple destroyed and the Sepulchre uncovered, unearthing three crosses and the titulus from Jesus' crucifixion. In Socrates' version of the story, Macarius, bishop of Jerusalem who was ordered to build a church on the former site of Venus' temple, had the three crosses placed in turn on the body of a deathly ill woman. The woman recovered at the touch of the



sign that this, indeed, was the cross of Jesus. Socrates adds that having likewise found the nails with which Christ had been fastened to the cross, Helena sent this to Constantinople, where they were smelted and incorporated in Emperor Constantine's helmet, as well as the bridle of his horse.

How a relic of the True Cross came to be lodged in the keeping of the Monastery in a small country in Far-East Asia is a sequel to the True Cross's saga as mystical and fascinating as its finding. It was in 2005 during the World Youth Day celebrations when Msgr. Volker Bauer of Germany offered Rev. Fr. Ronald "Archie" Thomas Cortez, founder of the Monasterio de San Jose, a sacred trust – the post of next guardian/keeper of the True Cross. This, of course, came long after the churches in Europe underwent radical transformation due to the advent of communism; with most of the religious edifices turned into museums or warehouses. Apart from this, the monasteries in Europe

monks are now facing the travails of old age. This would lead to an event that would open the doors of grace and healing to Filipinos and countless believers in Asia.

The Monasterio de San Jose itself is perched atop one of Tarlac's highest peaks, and is

nestled deep within the 247hectare Tarlac Eco-Tourism Park. One of the most iconic sites which Tarlac boasts is the 30-foot high statue of the Risen Christ, the Monastery's most popular landmark. The statue stands sentinel over the green valley, as if extending its protective arm over all flora

and fauna within its beatific scope. The Monastery has built a dormitory for the faithful who wish to renew their spirits with its serenity. Its priory is open for the conduct of spiritual renewal activities such as retreats and recollections.

For the members of Our Lady of Atonement Circle (OLAC) of Baguio City, the long-planned pilgrimage to the Monasterio de San Jose which did not push through on its original date in March, 2011 due to a tragic loss that left the DMIs of Baguio reeling and still recovering from, finally pushed through on September 14, 2011. At 3:00 a.m. of that day, 23 OLAC sisters boarded the City Government of Baguio's coaster at the Baquio Cathedral grounds to fulfill a dear sister's last wish. Pilgrimage chaplain was Fr. Emmanuel Panayo, pastor of Our Lady of Atonement Parish.

The OLAC sisters' pilgrimage was in memory of the late Vicarial Regent Sis. Margaret Ceoile who perished in a vehicular accident at Kennon Road on March 7, 2011. The Paiero she and four companions were riding in on their way to the Monasterio on that drizzly morning skidded off the zigzag road and plunged into a ravine. Only one of her companions survived. (Please see related story, "Sis. Mary Margaret Caoile, A Zealous and Passionate DMI", April-June, 2011 issue of the DMI Newsette. – Ed.)


The day before, Sis. Margie guested at our circle meeting during which she stressed the

importance of spiritual formation and enrichment prior to the exemplification of new members. The Monasterio was close to her heart, visiting the place two or three times a week and staying overnight at the Monastery dorm to pray the Divine Office with the Servants of the Risen Christ, the order founded by Fr. Archie. She urged the OLAC members to go on a pilgrimage to the Monasterio and mentioned going there the following day.

We were all shocked by the news of Sis. Margie's death. And it is taking us a long time to recover from the loss of an inspiring leader. We scheduled several dates for the pilgrimage to fulfill her last wish, but they all fell through. It might have been a blessing in disguise, for the sisters finally decided to go on September 14, the anniversary of the Monasterio and Feast of the Triumph of the Cross, and one of two days during the year when the relic is exposed to the public.

The sisters waited with bated breath for Sept. 14 as Baguio was experiencing heavy rains during the week and they feared having to postpone the pilgrimage. But Sept. 14 came, heralded by a cold and misty dawn, but no rain. The sisters left Baquio at 3:20 a.m., arriving for breakfast at the home of Regent Sis. Zeny Cabunilas in Panigui, Tarlac about an hour and a half later. The group then proceeded to the Monastery and arrived just in time for Mass.

A big crowd, numbering more

than 10,000, packed the monastery plaza under the sweltering sun. Heading the phalanx of priests at the concelebrated Mass (which included our Fr. Manny) was Archbishop Florentino Cinense, D.D. of the Archdiocese of Tarlac. Braving the heat and the incredible press of a large mass of pilgrims wishing to venerate the relic, the OLAC sisters, joined by some delegates from St. Vincent Ferrer Circle, Sis. Margie's home circle, patiently queued up and joined the long, slow shuffle to the Veneration Chapel.

The relic is usually housed in a silver "arqueta" or small ark, engraved with Catholic

symbols at its side. On this day, the patient pilgrim will be able to catch a glimpse of the relic and for 30 seconds or so spend time with a small, glass-encased piece of wood, not even larger than a foot in size, obviously scarred by age and bearing an inlaid carved image of the cross on its front. Experts have determined that the nondescript piece of wood is of olive, the hardy tree that characterized (and still does) the landscape of Jesus' time.

Halfway through the snaking queue, a semblance of order took place, four deep for each line. The singing of religious songs by volunteers bolstered

abuse the earth because we



the prayerful atmosphere that pervaded the place. Time stands still as one reached the head of the line. The only realities are you – and the unassuming piece of wood before you. You kneel on the cushion provided by the monks for the pilgrims before the relic and pray, pray with all your heart before the wood which had touched our Savior's flesh and soaked by our Savior's blood.

Throughout the experience, a patina of solemnity is maintained. Time is kept by novice monks who strike a

dome-shaped Sacring Bell/ Cymbalum with a small wooden mallet every 30 seconds or so, signaling the pilgrim that it is time for him to rise and give way for the others after him. The experience may strike others as an ordeal, an exercise to test one's patience in withstanding heat and hunger, but the thoughtful pilgrim will find it a fulfilling one, a real-life allegory of the hardships one has to endure to achieve a state of grace.

As the OLAC sisters filed out of the chapel, the rain fell in torrents. They waited for a lull in the storm, then ran across the plaza, past the Priory and down the road where their coaster was parked. They had to scuttle plans to visit the Monasterio's parks and visit the giant statue of the Risen Christ.

Back to Paniqui where a late lunch at the Cabunilas Family's newly-renovated ancestral home awaited them. Lunch was served after Fr. Manny's blessing of the house. It was a meal marked by laughter and camaraderie, two hours filled with the pure joy of unity and togetherness by sisters who only see each other once a month, and wish to spend

more time with each other.

Still happily sharing stories, this time sated and rested, the sisters wended their way home, exhausted but happy, and nursing a fervent hope to go back to Monasterio de San Jose to breathe its pure air, to drink in full measure its serenity without the hassle of a huge crowd and to once again answer the call of a relic, the only one of its kind in Asia, and partake of the True Cross' mead of healing - in mind, body and spirit. And that is a promise the OLAC sisters are sure to keep!
