Spiritual Well-Being and Peace of our Land". That's after a concelebrated Mass at 1:00 p.m. by Archbishop Quevedo and Most Rev. Archbishop Romulo Valles of the Archdiocese of Zamboanga at the Metropolitan Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception and motorcade to the Astoria Regency Convention Center. Registration of delegates starts at 7:00 a.m. up to 12:00 noon. The dinner at 6:00 p.m. followed by a fellowship (dubbed Bienvenido Night) program will feature dances by the diocesan officers and members of circles in the host diocese.

The business meeting is scheduled for Day 2 (May 22) after a Eucharistic celebration at the convention venue by Most Rev. Bishop Martin Jomuad of the Prelature of Basilan. The international officers and mission chairpersons will render reports covering the period of their incumbency to be followed by the election of the 20ll-12 set of international officers.

Capping the day's program is the Filipiniana Night with presentation numbers from the 13 DMI regions of the country.

Day 3 (May 23) will start with a Holy Mass also at the convention venue by DMI Vice-International Chaplain Fr.
Jerome Cruz. The convention closes with the presentation of the 2011-12 international officers and selection of the next convention venue.

That's the 3-day convention program which officially ends before lunch on Sunday. Depending on the delegates' available time, shopping and a tour of Zamboanga's famous tourist spots can be arranged in the afternoon.

The Convention Committee is now in the thick of preparations for the event and has issued the following particulars:

he DMI 17th National Biennial Convention will be held in Zamboanga City on May 21-23, 2010 as approved during the 16th Biennial Convention in Cebu City with Sis. Lydia Ramirez, vice-international regent for Mindanao as convention host.

It is barely five months to go before the convention D-day and we have a number of reasons why we are inviting you to come to Zamboanga and join us in the celebration of this big event.

First, Zamboanga is a peaceful city. The Carmelite Monastery where both the late Cory Aquino and later her son Noynoy had their retreats when they needed to make important decisions is in this city. The fear of many about the peace and order situation

in Zamboanga City is unfounded. Most of the conflicts published in the newspapers happen elsewhere far from the city. The news, however, are datelined in Zamboanga because media reporters are based in the city.

Second, Zamboanga is a continental city with people of diverse cultural orientations.

Colorful minarets can be seen along the coastal areas but the cross dominates the city's skyline. The city is essentially Catholic Christian with a majority of the population belonging to different parishes under the Archdiocese of Zamboanga.

Third, Zamboanga has for its patron saint Our Virgin Mary of the Pillar - familiarly known as Nuestra Senora La Virgen del Pilar - regarded as the Protectress of the people of Zamboanga which showcases Zamboanga's devotion to the Blessed Mother and is the central focus of the spiritual life of Zamboanguenos. One of the biggest celebrations in the city is the Feast of the Immaculate Conception, patron saint of the DMI, that takes place at the Metro Cathedral.

Fourth, Zamboanga City has picturesque tourist spots, among them the Pasonanca Park with its famous treehouse and beautiful flowers (earning for the city the monicker City of Flowers) especially along its *Paseo de Jardin*, the colorful vintas dotting the bay, the historic Fort Pilar and its *Paseo del* Mar and many

more. It is also a shopper's paradise where beautiful items and other products coming from Malaysia, Indonesia and other countries can be purchased at bargain prices - from the barter trade zone and other shopping areas.

Let us not miss this opportunity of coming to Zamboanga, if not for all the reasons cited above, at least for our love and devotion to Mama Mary and the experience of great bonding among DMI sisters that takes place only once every two years. Let us all "keep bells ringing while praying, sharing and giving" and what better place and occasion than to be in Zamboanga for our 17th Biennial Convention!

DMI Reaches Out to Ondoy Victims

Manila and parts of
Rizal, Bulacan and
Laguna provinces last
September 26, 2009 when
Ondoy, supposedly just a
tropical storm, not yet a
typhoon, brought intense
flooding, the kind that had not
been experienced before,
wreaking so much destruction
of both lives and property.

But it is adversities such as this that also spawn shining moments - of selfless love and sacrifice, of heroism, of overflowing generosity of people. The days and weeks that followed saw long lines of volunteers wanting to be of help, truck loads of relief goods being brought to evacuation centers and still-flooded communities where residents awaited help as well as other forms of assistance.

The Daughters of Mary Immaculate International was one of many religious organizations and NGOs that

responded to the urgent need of the hour. Many DMI circles extended assistance in the outreach activities through their respective parishes. Responding to the call for assistance by International Regent Sis. Jean Velarde, donations arrived at the DMI office, the first from Batangas City through Past International Regent Sis. Sonia Mayo. Donations were received in cash and in kind - clothes, blankets, towels, food, toiletries, etc. Region IV RR

Sis. Tesy Villarino reported providing meals for 600 families in Northville and Marbolan and 150 bags of rice to flood victims in Crossville in Marilao, Bulacan. Sis. Jean designated Region V RR and Int'l Treasurer Sis. Lydia Ordonez as coordinator of DMI's relief effort, a few of which were recorded on camera which accompany this write-up.

Diocese of Cubao Hosts Region V Assembly

his year' assembly of Region V was held last November 28, 2009 at the Multi-Purpose Hall of the Obispado de Cubao in Quezon City.

Some 315 delegates coming from the six dioceses comprising Region V - the Dioceses of Antipolo, Cubao, Imus, Kalookan, Manila and Paranaque converged at the 10th floor of the Obispado as early as 7:00 a.m.

The conference session started with a Holy Mass officiated by DMI Vice-Int'l Chaplain Fr. Jerome Cruz. Co-

celebrating with him was Msgr. Claro "Matt" Garcia, pastor of the Immaculate Conception Parish in Tayuman, Tondo, Manila who holds a number of positions in the Archdiocese of Manila. notably as director and vicechair of the Manila Cathedral School, director of the Marian Youth Movement of the Ecclesiastical Province of Manila and chair of the Manila Archdiocesan and Parochial School Association Commission on Early Childhood Education.

Fr. Jerome, in his homily, dwelt on the theme of the

assembly, "The DMI, Taking After the Hearts of Jesus and Mary". He said that relationships are the most important in life and gave as example the very special relationship between Jesus and Mary. "Do we have that kind of relationship?" he asked. Fr. Jerome also said that love must be expressed in a concrete way in our daily lives as a manifestation of our great love for the Sacred Heart of Jesus and the Immaculate Heart of Mary. Love finds concrete expression through service, unselfish service where one loses himself for others.

Sis. Lydia Ordonez, Region V representative (RR) and international treasurer, welcomed the delegates after the traditional parade of colors, singing of the National Anthem and Pledge to the Flag led by Diocesan Regent Sis. Josie Sioson of the Diocese of Cubao and the acknowledgment of circles by Diocesan Regent Sis. Lorie Manalansan of the Diocese of Kalookan.

Main feature of the morning session was the keynote address by Msgr. Matt Garcia

who was introduced by Diocesan Regent Sis. Milde Tong of the Diocese of Paranaque. Msgr. Matt cited the theme of the assembly which emphasizes the spirituality of the two hearts in observance of the Year of the Hearts of Jesus and Mary. He then expounded on the word ROC-K which stands for: R renewal/reparation, Ooblation/offertory to God, C conservation/consecration, and K - Kingdom of the Sacred Heart. He said that the reign of God starts here and now.

Noting the age range of his audience. Msgr. Matt also talked on the Ten Commandments for Persons Above 40 Years "to be able to configure your hearts to the Hearts of Jesus and Mary". These are:

- 1. Value people. (Value the people around you over material possessions.)
- 2. Be a responsible steward of God' grace. (Manage well the resources made available to you. Teach others how to fish instead of giving them fish.) 3. Live intelligently. (Live for the present. Stop fretting over the past and worrying too much about the future.)
- 4. Discover responsible enjoyment. (Free yourself of responsibilities that rightfully belong to others. Do not be a full-time baby-sitter for your grandchildren; taking care of them is the responsibility of their mother.)
- 5. Open yourself to accept the unacceptable. (Aging is an inevitable process. Grow old gracefully.)
- 6. Don't overwork to avoid stress. (Be thankful for what you have. Do not strive for more when you have enough.) 7. Learn to love. (Be able to love even your enemies.)

8. Learn forgiveness. (Be able to forgive in order to have peace of mind.) 9. Befriend death. (Do not be afraid of dying. Prepare for the eventuality for it means your passage into eternal life.) 10. Befriend God. (Be reconciled with others and with God and be

at peace with yourself.)

Msgr. Matt ended his presentation by challenging his audience with these words of St. John Mary Vianney: "The Lord has drawn us to His Heart. He is the One Who has loved us so much. Why shouldn't we love him in return?"

Scheduled to open the afternoon session was a talk by former Optical Media Board Chairman. Edu Manzano, now a vicepresidential candidate. Mr. Manzano was prepared to speak on "The Power and Strong Influence of Media in the Life of Every Filipino". He was, however, not able to make it in time for his presentation as he failed to catch a plane to Manila. (He was with the party of presidential candidate, Gilbert Teodoro, former Secretary of National Defense, in Mindanao.) International Chairperson for Morality in Media Sis. Sonia Manlapig who was assigned to introduce Mr. Manzano extended to the assembly delegates his apologies.

Vice-International Regent for Luzon Sis. Alice Capiral in her message thanked, on behalf of International Regent Sis. Jean Velarde, the generous donors who responded to the call for assistance for victims of Typhoon Ondoy in Region V. She called on DMI sisters to follow the example of Mama Mary in her unconditional love,

In her closing remarks, Paranaque Diocesan Regent Sis. Milde Tong thanked the delegates for their active participation in the assembly and the working committee who worked very hard for its success. The closing prayer was led by Diocesan Regent Sis. Mimi Gan of the Diocese of Manila.

Diocesan Regent Sis. Cora Afuang of the Diocese of Antipolo emceed the day-long program.

Cause of Our Joy Circle Launches "Skwela", Gives Free Computer classes

he Cause of Our Joy Circle of St. Joseph Parish, Tondo, Manila recently launched SKWELA under the Department of Education's Alternative Learning System (ALS). The program aims to educate out-of-school youth and adults who have not been able to attend regular high schools. Under the program, beneficiaries attend review classes once or twice a week to prepare them for the A & E Test. Once they pass the test, they are awarded secondary certificates and become full-fledged high school graduates.

The Circle also graduated the 30th batch of its 3-month Basic Computer Class last May 9, 2009 at the St. Joseph Formation Bldg. Classes are held every Saturday.

The first recipients of elearning under the program attended classes at the Sandiwaan Center for Learning at Smoky Mountain in Tondo. The computers being used during classes are donations from generous individuals and organizations such as the Manila Metro Rotary Club, Congressman Jim Lopez, City Councilor Uno Lim

Signature Campaign vs. Reproductive Health Bill Launched in the Archdiocese of Ozamis

The DMI Archdiocese of Ozamis recently passed a resolution calling on all DMI officers and members in the Archdiocese to manifest their spiritual conviction as one Church with one faith by way of a signature campaign expressing their vehement objection to the proposed Reproductive Health and Population Development Act of 2008. The move was adopted from the resolution of the City Council of Ozamis.

the resolution cited the reasons for their objection to the bill: the anti-life contents of the bill detailing the harmful programs being proposed such as the twochild per family policy, free access of individuals including adolescents to abortifacients and contraceptives, introduction of inappropriate sex education in schools adversely affecting the wholesome and moral development of students, and imposing penalties such as imprisonment and/or fines of up to P50,000 for those who will not participate in the program.

The resolution also stresses that the bill is unconstitutional, particularly violating Art. II, Sec. 12 of the

Philippine
Constitution
which
states:
"The
State
recognizes
the sanctity
of
family life

and shall protect and strengthen the family as a basic autonomous social institution. It shall equally protect the life of the mother and the life of the unborn from conception."

The DMI disagrees with the reason for enactment of the bill seeking to curb population growth as a way to eliminate poverty which avoids focusing on the root causes of the problem, among them graft and corruption, land use and conversion, flawed land reform program, wrong priorities, etc.

The resolution further states that utilizing a fraudulent reproductive health policy to achieve a good end - for government to adopt and enforce measures and policies that truly address the

authentic needs

of the communities, of women, mothers, children and young people - is morally wrong. It neglects the

people's right of conscience and does not respect and protect their religious convictions. The measures that the bill proposes also violate the rights of spouses to build a family in line with their religious principles which include the safeguarding of the true and responsible parenthood and the rights of children

Our Lady of The Miraculous Medal

(As part of members' Formation Program, the Risen Christ Circle of Paranaque City recently introduced *Mama Mary's Time* as a regular part of their monthly meetings for the purpose of knowing more about the Blessed Mother who is our model and guide. This article by Sis. Lita was excerpted from her research and sharing about the origin of the Our Lady of the Miraculous Medal whose feast is celebrated on November 27. - Ed.)

guess not many of us know that the Miraculous Medal came from our Blessed Mother herself. She designed it, revealed it and ordered it propagated throughout the world. These facts are from the testimony of St. Catherine Laboure of the Sisters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul to whom Mary appeared three times in the year 1830 in Paris.

The First Apparition - July 18, 1830

At around 11:30 that night, Sis. Catherine heard someone calling her name three times. Waking up, she saw a four- or five-year-old child dressed in white who told her: "Come to the chapel. The Blessed Virgin is waiting for you."

She quickly followed the child who all the time walked at her left side, lighting up their way with the door almost automatically opening as they approached it. The chandeliers and all the candles in the chapel were lit up when they arrived reminding Sis. Catherine of Midnight Mass. Then the child said, "Here is the Blessed Virgin. Here she is." She then heard the rustle of a silk dress and saw the Blessed Virgin seated on the Director's seat. Sis. Catherine quickly went to her side and knelt before her and placed her hands on Mama Mary's knees. The Blessed Virgin said, "My child, the good God wants to charge you with a mission." She told Sis.

Catherine of the sufferings and contradictions that she would experience but not to be afraid for she will have grace; to tell everything with confidence and simplicity to him whose task is to direct her. She also told her to come to the foot of the altar and that graces will be poured on all those who ask with confidence and fervor. Sis. Catherine remained kneeling for so long listening to the instructions and when she got up from the altar step, the child said, "She is gone." The clock struck 2:00 am when Sis. Catherine returned to her room, the encounter lasting almost 2 ½ hours.

The Second Apparition - November 27, 1830

Our Lady appeared at 5:30 pm that day, dressed in white with silvery blue mantle with veil the color of dawn. Mary was of medium height. indescribably beautiful, her feet resting on a sphere. Her hands, raised slightly above her waist, held a globe, rings on her fingers inset with precious stones. Dazzling rays of light darted from the jewels. The globe represents the world and each person in particular while the rays of light are the symbol of the graces she bestows on those who ask for them. Then an oval frame surrounded the Blessed Virgin, in a semi-circle from the level of her hands up around her head. There appeared in letters of gold

the inscription, "O Mary conceived without sin, pray for us who have recourse to thee". The golden globe vanished, her hands lowered down, remained outstretched. The oval frame turned around and seen on the reverse side were the letter M surmounted with a little cross with a bar beneath, and at its foot, the Sacred Hearts of Jesus and Mary, one encircled with a crown of thorns and the other pierced with a sword. An interior voice said, "Have a medal struck on this model. Those who wear it and say a short prayer will be indulgenced and enjoy the special protection of the Mother of God, especially if the medal is worn around the neck."

The Third Apparition - December, 1830


The Blessed Virgin again appeared at 5:30 pm that day. There was the same rustle of her silk dress, but this time she was at the center of the altar, near and a little behind the Tabernacle. She wore the same high-necked dress with the color of dawn. This third apparition - the second and the last about the Medal sounded like a farewell, but she left this message: "You will not see me anymore but you will hear my voice during your prayers."

Sis. Catherine's confessor, Father Aladel who seemed cold and indifferent when she first approached him about the Medal, eventually listened and took up the subject of the apparition with Msgr. Quelen, archbishop of Paris who immediately said, "I see no drawback in striking this Medal."

So in 1832, the medal of the Immaculate Conception was struck with Msgr. Quelen eagerly giving public testimony of his faith in the Immaculate Conception and confidence in the Medal. This later paved the way for the dogmatic definition of Mary's Immaculate Conception. Msgr. Quelen was also instrumental in the inclusion of the invocation "Mary conceived without sin" in the Litany of the Blessed Virgin.

The many marvels of conversion and healing, of peace and protection obtained through the Medal led the people to call it the "Miraculous Medal". In 1836, St. John Mary Vianney, patron of parish priests, consecrated his parish to the Miraculous Medal. Pope Gregory XVI kept medals at the foot of his crucifix and distributed them to visitors. Then, too, the Vincentian Martyrs of China received wonderful favors in mission lands.

Largely because of the devotion awakened by Mary's Miraculous Medal, the dogma of the Immaculate Conception was defined by Pope Pious IX in 1854. In 1858, St. Bernadette Soubirous in Lourdes who was wearing the medal saw Our Lady with her

hands outstretched just like in the Miraculous Medal. before placing her joined hands on her breast, saying, "I am the Immaculate Conception." St. Therese of Lisieux saw the Blessed Virgin's heavenly smile in an image of the Miraculous Medal and was cured from a serious illness. It was also this medal that St. Mary Goretti. the martyr of purity, received as her badge when on her death bed, she became a child of Mary.

Mary's motherly love for us is also manifested on the reverse side of the medal: the M and two hearts express this. She is not only Queen; she is also the Mother of Sorrow and Co-redemptrix. Knowing suffering qualifies her to console us in our trials and afflictions. Close to her Son's thorn-crowned Heart is her own pierced heart. In sorrow as in glory, Son and

mother are always together as in Calvary, she sorrowfully stood beneath her Son's Cross.

From Mama Mary's outstretched hands stream rays of light symbolizing the graces she obtains from her Son, as she promised for all who ask for them. And it would seem that the asking is best done through prayer on her Medal, the prayer that she herself composed and revealed: "O Mary conceived without sin, pray for us who have recourse to thee." The Medal is Mary's gift to us. She wants us to partake of the great graces which she pledged herself to shower on those who, wearing her medal, call upon her for help. May we listen to her voice and dedicate ourselves forever to love her and wear the badge that identifies us as her very own.
