

t was a dream-come-true for the Our Lady of the Abandoned Circle of the Diocese of Antipolo.

The circle's long-planned pre-natal clinic, a project of the circle's Pro-Life Committee, is now a reality with the inauguration and blessing of the clinic last May 3, 2014 after the circle's first Saturday Mass.

Located at the rear of the Basilica of the Our Lady of the Abandoned in Marikina City, the clinic will render free pre-natal services to indigent women of the parish. When it is time for the patient to give birth, she will be referred to a hospital for free delivery.

Dr. Belen Santos, an obstetrician-gynecologist who heads the circle's Pro-Life Committee will be the clinic's

chief administrator and will be assisted by other circle members. Clinic hours are from 8:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. every Friday.

A call for volunteer doctors has been made in the parish in order to sustain and expand the operations of the clinic which was made possible through the generous donation of circle members, among them Sis. Elena Mendoza, from whom a big bulk of the equipment came.

Rev. Fr. Reynante Tolentino, DMI chaplain and parish administrator, and Fr. Rommel Felizardo blessed the clinic. A sumptuous breakfast was shared by the sisters who attended the event.

Prayer Room of the Holy Eucharist Parish. The only human intervention during the exercise was the writing of the participant's name on the spiritual card.

Small miracles of healing had been made manifest during the session with the Holy Spirit seemingly working amongst the participants leading to the healing of many inner wounds and brokenness. According to the participants, they felt a feeling of peace suddenly enveloping them.

Rev. Fr. Elmo Ilao, the Mission's spiritual adviser, gave a talk to the participants before the end of the seminar. A follow-up session is held a week or so after each seminar for evaluation and assessment of seminar results.

Aside from the healing of a person's inner hurts and pains, the Intergenerational Healing Seminar also involves the healing of the family tree, the healing of memories and reparenting the child within of an adult person.


Alex is the second daughter that I have lost. Daniella was a stillborn baby and my fourth child.


