he 2017 DMII Luzon Area Conference was held last October 20-22, 2017 at Batis Aramin Resort in Lucban Quezon. Host of the conference was the Diocese of San Pablo, Region VI comprising the whole of Laguna Province. The conference theme was "DMI as Active Agent of Transformation in the Parish and Communities".

More than 800 delegates represented DMI sisters from Regions I to VIII broken down as follows: Region I – 14, Region II – 118, Region III – 98, Region IV – 72, Region V – 203, Region VI – 101, Region VII – 156, and Region VIII -14. The DMI International Board was represented by 26 officers, board members and mission chairpersons.

The conference officially opened on the afternoon of October 20 with the enthronement and consecration of the image of the Blessed Mother,

followed by the entrance of colors and the Parade of Circles with circle regents carrying their circle banners.

Sis. Ruby Macario, Vice-International Regent for Luzon gave the opening remarks where she stressed the role of the DMII as instrument for improvement, change and good relations in the parish through its missions dedicated to Mother Mary. She informed the delegates about the upcoming activities in the year-long 40th Anniversary celebration of the organization that will culminate in May, 2018 as part of the 21st DMII Biennial Convention at the CAP Convention Center, Camp John Hay in Baguio City. The rest of the year-long celebration includes Mission Week on November 13 to 18, 2017 during which various projects and activities for the DMI Missions will be held simultaneously in all the DMI regions nationwide. The Walk and Dance for Mary will be held at the Luneta Grandstand on Feb. 10, 2018 from 6 to 9 a.m. Sis. Ruby also urged the DMI sisters to register early for the Biennial Convention as the venue can accommodate up to 2,000 delegates only. Acceptance of registration will be done on a first-comefirst-served basis. The conference fee must be pre-paid.

No walk-ins will be allowed.

The International Chairpersons for the Missions then presented their programs of action and provided updates. The delegates were then grouped for the 5 missions for simultaneous workshop discussions. The workshops followed a uniform format: workshop participants gave inputs regarding mission activities being done at present, the various factors that helped in accomplishing the mission as well as the hindrances they experienced while doing the mission.

- Intensify activities for promising ventures
- Extend assistance in the areas of product development and marketing
- Organize cooperatives and other such groups to strengthen the financial capability of project participants



She presented the plans and programs of the International Board during the incumbent IR's term such as drawing out the rules and regulations for the Cal; amity Fund, the formation of additional committees to further strengthen DMII's operation as well as the identification of pilgrimage sites in various regions to enhance members' spiritual journey and encourage interaction among DMI sisters all over the country. Sis. Ruby also reported to the delegates the outputs of the mission workshops done the day before.

The Most Rev. Leandro N. Castro, rector of the St. Alphonsus Regional Seminary in Lucena City was the conference keynote speaker. His talk centered on Mary, her virtues, her active discipleship and other attributes which the DMIs as her daughters must emulate for "the responsibility of the daughter is to take after the mother". media, give hope to prisoners and their families ("Hope makes us free.") and involve the youth through apostolates.

The afternoon's speaker was Miss Socorro Alicia "Cory" Quirino, TV host, author and newspaper columnist, health and wellness guru and beauty pageant titleholder. Cory is the granddaughter of the late President Elpidio Quirino. She was greeted with ooohs and aaahs as the conference hosts led by Sis. Elvie Arambulo escorted her to the stage. Cory was an embodiment of ageless beauty, looking very attractive, slim and tall in her shift dress, and a smile that never left her pretty face. The ooohs and aaahs even became louder when she unhesitatingly revealed her age: 65 years old.

Cory said that women use their energy for those they love but cautioned her audience that they must leave a little for themselves. She then gave several tips on how to have unity and balance of mind, body and spirit. "Emotions become physical manifestations and stress is the mother of all illness," she added.

The Eucharistic celebration, an anticipated Mass, was presided by the Most Rev. Emilio Z. Marquez, bishop emeritus of the Diocese of Lucena with DMI Chaplain Fr. Jerome Cruz as co-celebrant.

After a brief respite, the delegates started returning to the conference hall in their Maria Clara circa 1800 outfits, adding so much glitter and color to the evening fellowship and dinner. The evening's center piece was a dance contest among the seven regions (Region VI was a non-participant). he Diocese of Butuan headed by Diocesan Regent Sis. Zenaida Lagnada hosted the Region XII Assembly at the Almont Inland Hotel & Resort in Butuan City on Nov. 18, 2017. Delegates from the Dioceses of Agusan del Sur, Bukidnon, Butuan, Gingoog City, Cagayan de Oro, Tandag (Surigao del Sur) nd Surigao del Norte.

Region XII Representative Sis. Teresita Miranda declared the fortmal opening of the assembly at 9:30 a.m. followed by the opening remarks by Sis. Zeny Lagnada.

The inspirational message of International Regent Sis. Lelis Pimentel included the plans and programs of the DMII International Board during her term. She also urged the delegates to register early for the 21st Biennial Convention in Baguio City in May, 2018 when the culminating activity of the 40th Anniversary

celebration will also take place.

The morning guest speaker was Rev. Fr. Randy Odchigue. His topic was "Digital Media, the Church and Ethics". The outline of his presentation consisted of the changing reality that digital media (DM) imposes, the challenge it poses to the Church and the ethical questions and opportunities it creates. He classified people at present as "digital natives" (born in the 1990's and up or the millenials) who are tech-raised and networked and "digital migrants" (those born before the '90's) who are tech-adapted mentored by the digital natives and who use old language.

Fr. Odchigue cited the challenges that DM imposes: Virtual becomes real, connectivity vs. isolation, wants vs. needs and instant and unli attitude. The ethical questions that DM poses: fake news vs. the truth, cyberstealing, cyberbullying, bashing vs. magnanimity and objectifying (such as pornography, child trafficking, women being treated as objects) vs. valuing.

"Digital media when used properly provides a number of positive opportunities as new evangelization (evangelizing anytime, anywhere, interactive participation and ability to reach out anytime), opportunity for community as networked humans, knowledge and greater abilitry for care and counseling. DM is also a great equalizer (all voices are heard, can hold people accountable and transparency becomes easy). He cautioned his audience to "THINK before you post" - T – is it true? H – is it hurtful? I – is it illlegal? N – is it necessary? And K – is it kind?

Ms. Nelia Arina, an image consultant and personality development lecturer was the first speaker in the afternoon. Ms. Arina, now a DMI member, first related her journey towards becoming a DMI. For her, the word SELF stands for: S – serving and sharing, E – empathizing, L – listening and F – finding out. She said she applies this to her daily life. She also said that aging gracefully is manifested in a woman's apperance, behavior and communication.

The International Mission Chairpersons presented their mission programs and cited some best practices that they gathered from reports they receive from different circles all over the country. They were Sisters Cora Afuang for Pro-Life, Milde Tong for Upliftment of Women Workers, Edna May Landicho for Morality in Media and Cathy Pineda for Youth Welfare. DMI Newsette Editor Sis. Sally Estrada talked about "DMII Promotions and the DMI Newsette".

Rev, Fr. Carlito Clase, pastor of Christ the King Parish in Tungao, Butuan City who was also presider of the Holy Mass held later talked on "Marian Life" and the role of Mama Mary in the history of redemption. His parting message: "*Isabuhay ninyo and halimbawa ni Maria*".

RISEN CHRIST CIRCLE HOLDS WORK & PERSONAL EFFECTIVENESS WORKSHOP FOR STREET SWEEPERS

The Risen Christ Circle of Holy Eucharist Parish, Moonwalk Village, Paranaque sponsored a workshop on Work and Personal Effectiveness last Sept. 20, 2017.

The main objective of the workshop was to empower women, particularly the marginalized, in the community. It is a reality that many women, especially those who lack education or work on menial jobs are oftentimes overlooked, oppressed, abused and/or violated. This dismal condition has resulted in the women's very low self-esteem or self-worth and poor self-image The workshop is one of several

that can be utilized as an empowerment tool to advance the cause of these marginalized women. The empowerment must start with themselves first.

Spearheading the activity was the circle's Upliftment of Women Workers Committee under the auspices and generous support of Sis. Milde Tong, international chairperson for Upliftment of Women Workers who is from Risen Christ Circle.

A total of 62 street sweepers from Paranaque's City Environment and Natural Resources Office (CENRO) who are assigned to Barangay Moonwalk trooped to the IDM Building in Moonwalk Village after their morning duties to attend the whole-day workshop. CENRO employs over 1,000 employees consisting of street sweepers, creek cleaners, the information group and operations.

The workshop was designed and directed by Past Regent Sis. Anching McMurray, a psychologist and educator for more than 40 years. She and her group of professional trainors have designed and run several very successful training programs for leading corporations in the country.

The participants were officially welcomed by Sis. Milde. An overview of the program was provided by Sis. Anching and Sis. Helen de Leon, lead workshop facilitator.

Mr. Boi Mojica, Paranaque's acting assistant head of CENRO, DMI's project partner in the activity, also addressed the participants. An expert in waste management, he first paid tribute to the street sweepers for helping make Paranaque

earn the distinction of being one of the cleanest cities in Metro Manila and winning several recognition awards, both local and national and even an international one. He gave the participants bits of advice such as taking good care of themselves like wearing their rain capes during bad weather and reflective vests to avoid accidents and to show at all times that they are worthy of respect. He also said that they may earn extra income by endorsing them for participation in a CENRO livelihood project of making shopping bags from recycled plastic straw and juice tetra packs.

The workshop proper consisted of theory inputs (lectures) by speakers, all Past Regents of the Risen Christ Circle: Sis. Anching on Self-Awareness and Self-Esteem, Sis. Helen Balmores on Values, Attitude and Relationships, Sis. Mossette Don on Social Ethics, Sis. Sonia Manlapig on Community Relations and Additional Income and Sis. Linda Chincuanco on Empowerment of Women. Included in the last topic were salient provisions of the Magna Carta of Women which guarantees the rights of women under the law. Sis. Helen Balmores also enlivened the workshop with fun ice-breakers enjoyed by both the participants and the facilitators.

The participants were later divided into small groups to answer prepared questions as their reaction to the topics discussed. Table facilitators from Risen Christ Circle were assigned to each group to clarify some points and ensure that the questions are answered correctly by the participants.







During the open forum held later, earning additional income stood out as the most asked question. Sis. Milde offered several suggestions such as part-time work in homes within the village with 101% honesty as the main requirement. Another option is joining a women's ministry, similar to a cooperative. One such group is already existing with crocheted coasters as a product. She has offered to provide the materials and the patterns and purchase the finished products afterwards. An exporter who buys all kinds of scrap paper is a third option.

Mr. Bernie Amurao, the head of CENRO gave the closing remarks. He thanked the DMII for helping the street sweepers in uplifting their lives as well as for providing the facilities and meals during the workshop.

All in all, it was a highly successful workshop and the participants expressed gratitude and appreciation for the attention and learnings they gained. They also requested that they be given another chance to attend similar activities in the future.
