

"Give Me your sins," Jesus explained, "in order that I may pardon them all."

"O Divine Infant," said Jerome, "You make me weep for joy!"

REGION IX ASSEMBLY HELD IN ILOILO CITY

The Smallville 21 Hotel in Iloilo City was the venue of the Region IX Assembly last September 10, 2021 with the theme "The DMII Journeying Together in Synodality and Discernment with Mama Mary".

A total of 318 delegates attended the assembly coming from the dioceses comprising Region IX – the Archdioceses of Jaro and Capiz and the Dioceses of Kalibo, Bacolod and San Carlos.

After the enthronement and consecration of Mama Mary's image and the Parade of Circles with the regents of participating circles carrying their respective circle banners, Sis. Bebera Barrido, regent of the Archdiocese of Jaro acknowledged and welcomed the assembly participants and guests, the past regional and international officers and International Regent Sis. Sionee Naraga.

Sis. Sionee gave her inspirational message. She expounded on the theme and exhorted everyone to prepare ourselves to

journey in synodality with our brethren, so that we can walk together harmoniously, where in journeying, nobody is left behind and nobody will leave anyone behind. The Holy Spirit, she said, can empower and work in us. She also shared three points – Prayer by which we communicate with God,, Love which empowers us to serve joyfully and not feeling burdened and Living by Example to show what truly is a life with God and Mama Mary.

Fr. Aris James Java keynoted the assembly, starting his talk with a Synod Prayer. He then explained the reasons why Pope Francis called for this historical synod to facilitate renewal within the Church seeking to build bridges between the people of God. He tried to relate communion, the first of three concepts alongside participation and mission in the life of DMIs. He cited the factors that prevent us from having communion. He said that according to Pope Francis, there are three viruses, undetected and unseen, that silently attack relationship of people and have detrimental effects. These are: the virus of isolationism (withdrawing from the community is very counterproductive), the virus of individualism (me, myself, mine), and the virus of racism (clannish attitude)

If we reached real communion, participation and mission are possible. The beauty of life comes from the realization that we are all connected, brothers and sisters in one fatherhood of God. We are designed to connect. These concepts can only be understood in the context of prayerful discernment.

If there is one thing that our Blessed Mother possesses, it is a discerning spirit and this is the value which every Christian should possess. Discernment means "to sort out, to distinguish or to discriminate, recognizing something as distinct or different". It is discovering in prayer how the Lord wishes us to act personally, that is knowing the will of God for us in the reality of everyday life.

Fr. Java's talk was followed by an open forum.

After lunch and a short break, the afternoon session started with a Zumba dance followed by the accomplishment reports on the missions by the diocesan regents. The reports were summaries of projects and activities of circles undertaken in the dioceses comprising Region IX. The presentors were Diocesan Regent Sis. Rosalinda Desales for the Diocese of San Carlos, DR Sis. Lilian Romero of the Diocese of Kalibo, Sis. Milagros Verano of the Diocese of Bacolod and Sis. Bebera Barrido of the Archdiocese of Jaro. The regional assembly ended with a Eucharistic celebration officiated by Most Rev. Jose Romeo Lazo, DD, archbishop of Jaro, Fr. Julius Alneria as liturgist and Frs. Christopher Villa and Mark Joseph Hormigoso as concelebrants. In the Archbishop's homily on the day's gospel, he said, "The lost one has to be found; we get lost and we find joy when we are found." And to the DMIs present: "You have found that you belong to the DMII. You have found Mary."

Region IX RR Sis. Ilda thanked the participants and the assembly organizing committee for a successful event and led the closing prayer.


REGION XIV HOLDS 8TH REGIONAL ASSEMBLY

From the Diocese of San Jose (NE) - Region 11

UPDATES FROM THE SAN JOSE CIRCLE

San Jose Circle Regent Sis. Jo Carino divided the circle members into four groups to undertake DMI Mission projects. Reported in this issue are activities undertaken for Morality in Media, Upliftment of Women Workers and Assistance to Prisoners' Families & their Victims.

For **Morality in Media**, Mission Chair Sis. Evangeline Ruanto and her members helped launch the Block Rosary Crusade that Fr. Jetty Ferrer, pastor of the St. Joseph Cathedral Parish conceptualized to celebrate the Rosary Month in October. The parish acquired 52 images of the Blessed Mother for distribution to the 38 barangays of San Jose City. The purpose was to propagate praying of the Holy Rosary among families in the parish during Rosary Month. The images were to be returned to the cathedral at the end of October.

Some members of the San Jose Circle were entrusted with the Blessed Mother's image. Sis. Josephine Mateo, a catechist, was designated leader of Zone 2 of Barangay Abar 1st. Circle sisters from nearby areas joined Sis. Josephine in the Block Rosary. Another sister, Sis. Nida Vicmundo who was entrusted with an image of Our Lady of Fatima covered Barangay Pinili, a remote barangay of the city. The families visited were those in the "laylayan ng lipunan" as Fr. Jetty had suggested. A laminated prayer guide accompanied each image.

Before the launch of the Block Rosary Crusade on October l, the group leaders first surveyed the families to be visited. Their experiences during the visits were varied. In Zone 2 of Bgy. Abar lst, the homes of povertystricken families were visited and the group had to enter narrow eskinitas that got flooded during a heavy rain. During the prayer, they used umbrellas inside the house .to protect them from the leaking roof. Those that the sisters visited in Bgy. Pinili were families who no longer go to church.

The common outcome of the visits that the DMI sisters reported was encouraging in that the families expressed appreciation for the visit and learning about the mysteries of the Rosary. The mysteries of the Rosary are all about Christ's passion and death on the Cross for the salvation of mankind as well as the Blessed Mother's role in His life, her sacrifices and pain for her Son's suffering and death. They also appreciated being visited by the sisters who expected nothing in return.

For **Upliftment of Women Workers**, Mission Chairperson Sis. Nida Vicmundo and her group chose to hold a demonstration on kimchi-making. Kimchi is a Korean pickled vegetable dish that has become very popular among Filipinos and can be a source of livelihood for the participants.

The demo was held on October 2, 2022 attended by 18 housewives from Bgy. Pinili. The activity was held at the barangay hall. Some DMI sisters were also present. The trainers were Ms. Maricar Aquino and Ms. Jessa Amparo who brought with them the materials and equipment for kimchi preparation.

The DMIs assisted the trainers in the preparation of ingredients like chopping the vegetables, etc. With printed recipes in hand, the participants went through the process of kimchi-making such as cleaning and salting the vegetables, preparing the

paste with seasonings and spices and putting them in jars for the fermentation process.

The trainers brought with them ready-to-eat kimchi for the participants to taste. They liked it and said that they will prepare some for the family and eventually sell kimchi as a small business venture.

For Assistance to Prisoners' Families & their Victims (APFV), the group headed by Sis. Ma. Luisa Lazaro coordinated with the BJMP in identifying families of persons deprived of liberty (PDL) needing help as well as the DSWD and barangay officials for information on the families' present circumstances and their addresses.

The sisters selected five families needing help the most. They are families of PDLs detained for violation

of the Dangerous Drugs Act of 2002. Accompanied by the barangay staff, they invited the families to go to the Barangay Hall on October 15 for the circle's gift-giving activity. A short program was held with Bgy. Captain Librado Dulay welcoming the families.

The APFV Committee also reached out to the PDLs at the city's BJMP facility through the following activities: distribution of 200 food packs and toiletries to the PDLs and the guards on October 15, praying the rosary and distribution of rosaries on Oct. 18 and a Holy Mass celebrated by Fr. Redentor Asuncion, Jr. on Oct. 24 as the culminating activity for Prison Awareness Month.

The DMI sisters felt fulfilled providing the PDLs with nourishment for both body and soul.

DIOCESAN PRO-LIFE COMMITTEE SPONSORS CERVICAL CANCER AWARENESS LECTURE

The Pro-Life Committee of the Diocese of Antipolo sponsored a lecture on Cervical Cancer Awareness last August 9, 2022 at the Marikina Super Health Center in coordination with the Marikina City Health Office.

It was an interactive session during which 33 DMI sisters and 50 women from 16 barangays of the city shared their experiences about the topic.

Ms. Daisy Velasquez, OIC of the City Health Office was the lecturer after which free Pap smear and cervical screening through visual inspection and acetic acid wash were conducted by Ms. Rhea San Juan of the City Health Office and Sis. Naneth Doles of the Nativity Circle.

The Diocesan Pro-Life Committee provided the needed supplies such as gloves, cotton, acetic acid solution, snacks for the attendees and tokens for the City Health Office staff. The Committee also sponsored the pathologist reading of the pap test of 50 women preregistered by the Barangay Health workers.

Information gathered from the lecture: Cervical cancer is a most common cancer among women, second only to breast cancer. Twelve Filipino women die from cervical cancer each day. It is caused by Human Papilloma Virus, transmitted by multiple sexual partners, smoking and risky behaviors. How to be prevented and protected: sexual abstinence, regular cervical screening/pap test, vaccination against HPV for adolescent girls 10 to 14 years old.

The result of the screening and tests were made available after two weeks.

According to Diocesan Regent Mercy Ong, the Diocese of Antipolo will continue holding seminars and lectures as part of its Cancer Awareness Campaign.

Bamboo planting is in line with the government's effort to improve the lives of the Filipinos through bamboo reforestation that will enhance the forest cover and eventually become a valuable economic and environmental resource. The roots of giant bamboo can efficiently absorb excess water and bind the soil together, thus reducing erosion.

Bamboo has rapidly transitioned from being "a poor man's lumber" to a soughtafter commodity now called "green gold". It is important for its ecological functions absorbing greenhouse gases, insulating carbon dioxide from the environment and producing more oxygen than its equivalent tree size. Its innumerable uses are felt in our daily lives – food, housing, building, construction and livelihood materials, medicines, ornaments and others.



We now meet every second Wednesday of the month (it used to be every first Tuesday) to pray the rosary and the virtues of Mama Mary together. We plan and brainstorm and share with each other our life's struggles and hopes.

Last year, we had mission as well as fun activities. For Oktoberfest, we invited women to come to church for some fun with karaoke and dancing. Some young adults came in costumes, thinking it was a Halloween party. They joined us in singing and dancing and had great fun nevertheless.

For Pro-Life, we went and praved the rosary and Divine Mercy in front of Planned Parenthood in Hempstead, New York, spearheaded by our Sis. Collette Sweeney, an active pro-lifer. We also supported our Knights of Columbus brother knights with their Coat Drive and Summer Picnic. We celebrated our first Christmas gathering, singing Christmas carols with our invited families and guests as our way of honoring the Blessed Mother giving us the Hope of Jesus. We gave gifts to unfortunate women at the Madonna Heights - single mothers, pregnant women, unemployed women, troubled women and those who are coping with life's trials - gifts according to their needs. The smiles on their faces were in turn their gift to us, the joy we felt for having been able to share the blessings of our lives.

On December 10, 2021, the Manilabased DMII International Board headed by International Chaplain Fr. Jerome Cruz formally installed the circle officers in a virtual ceremony in the presence of Msgr. Richard Bauhoff, pastor of the Holy Name of Jesus Parish, Woodbury, New York.

This year,2022, we had numerous exciting and spirit-filled activities such as the first DMI Retreat in March at the Immaculate Conception Parish in Queens, New York. We had our successful first Communion Breakfast in June with ten prospective members attending the activity. Fr. Nestor Matin celebrated a special mass for us.

During Lent, it had been a tradition with our family to go to the Our Lady of the Island for the Stations of the Cross and some circle members joined us this year. On Mother's Day in May, we offered flowers to our Blessed Mother and as we paraded holding our floral offering and praying a special Mother's Prayer, some became emotional. Msgr. A Pro-Life Witnessing: MY "MIRACLE BABY"

(Editor's Note: On August 13, 2022, a seminar on Pro-Life was attended by some DMI sisters in Region V at the St. Andrew the Apostle Parish in Makati City on the topic "Everything You Need to Know About Abortion But Are Afraid to Ask". The seminar speaker was Dr. Calum Miller of Oxford University Medical School in the UK. He is a medical doctor and at the same time teaches philosophy and his research focuses on abortion policy.)

During the Q & A portion of the seminar on abortion held at the St. Andrew Church in Makati on August 13, 2022, a teary-eyed father asked Dr. Calum Miller about a serious dilemma regarding a medical condition of his pregnant wife that would endanger her life. The father was crying and I cried, too. *Relate na relate ako!*

The question brought me back to the year 2002 when my husband and I were confronted with the same dilemma.

I was turning 40 years old when I became pregnant with our fourth child. My doctor told us that I'm having a high-risk pregnancy due to high blood pressure and gestational diabetes and he could not assure us that I and my baby would be safe. My husband and I prayed very hard, harder than we had ever done before.

When my pregnancy reached 6 ½ months, my doctor decided that I should be confined in hospital for him to be able to constantly monitor my condition. On the baby's seventh month, a Cesarian Section could safely be done.

I woke up at the recovery room after the CS procedure and my baby stayed at the neonatal ICU in critical condition, according to the doctor. He was fed through the tube and had blood transfusion. During that time, my husband cried a lot fearing the prospect of losing me or the baby. Unceasingly praying, we let go and LET GOD. "Your Will be done, Lord!"

I lost my husband in 2004 and was left taking care of four children including our youngest, our "miracle baby" who is now a tall and handsome (in my eyes!) 19-year-old.

Maverick Lloyd now studies in New York with his sister, Candy and elder brother, Neale. My eldest, Emmanuel is married and lives with his family here in the Philippines. My husband's sister looks after my three kids in New York.

Lloyd is now a college freshman and plays basketball. His team's latest game was in Atlantic City.

Looking back, I would say a partnership between Science and God had saved my Miracle Baby, a great collaboration between the Supreme Being and Science.

And for the father who asked Dr. Miller what to do in his present dilemma, I pray that he and his wife will be able to arrive at the right decision with the help of science and our God.

They forced us to be wise in avoiding those mistakes that they did, and they taught us how to smell toxic people from a distance and make our detours. The bad things that happened to us or which we did, as long as we have learned lessons from them are actually fertilizers for our soul.

Old age gives us time to review, to reassess our past and be grateful for the lessons we have learned. It is time to sing alleluias for the emotional and spiritual muscles we have grown, and the virtues we have developed. Give yourself time to be quiet. Enter into silence and listen to the Spirit of the Lord telling you that we, oldies, are loved; that we have a future in the arms of the Father. It is not good for old folks to demand attention and pity ourselves for our situation. If we attend to our mental health, we will be fine. And the people around us will be absolutely grateful. They have their own lives and present responsibilities. They are willing to support us emotionally and even financially. But they cannot be by our side 24/7.

Praying and being with the Lord is a good way to be mentally healthy. But seeing a friend, chatting on the phone with our friends and relatives, visiting those who are sick or alone, sharing food and flowers and small gifts with those who need, all these will cheer us up and make our lives feel useful.

And if we cannot move too much anymore as to visit our friends, and do our regular walking exercises, then we must see our situation, not as worse than before, but as different. We have a new stage of our life now. And with it comes a new mission. Our new mission is to keep happy, prayerful and healthy so that we do not cause others any problem. Not only that. If we are happy, we make other people happy, too. If we can just move around slowly and do very little tasks in our little space at home, then let us rejoice in the little corners that we find which need to be cleaned, arranged, kept in order. If we cannot do many things anymore, then pay attention to the little achievements of being able to move from the bed to the table, etc. There is something else that we can do: rejoice in the little movements and chores that we finish, no matter how small they may be.

This stage is different. We cannot compare it with the previous ones. Before we used to look at our surroundings on two feet. Now we watch people and things go by on our chair. Sooner or later, we might be watching things from our bed. The point of view is different now. But surely, we will discover other things, feel more things, react differently and still be our old selves. We can hear different songs and rhythms from what and how we see things. Before we had lots of energy. Now we have peace, patience, hope, delight in the Lord.

And thinking of the afterlife? Well, we do not really know much about what it will be there. We only know that we will be in God's company. Can anything be better than that? So, start reading the bible right now, so that you can know Jesus better. Knowing Him better, you will be sure that when you see Him face to face, you can have a rich conversation with Him. Listen to the good homilies online. They make us understand what Jesus means by His words in the bible. So the best way to prepare for the next life is to be a friend of Jesus NOW.
